



Exam Success 2022

The school's attainment and achievement levels continue to thrive ensuring that the hard work of our young people is rewarded. The government benchmark (known as our Virtual Comparator - VC) is the level of attainment we are expected to reach. From the figures below it is clear to see that **we outperform our VC at every key measure.**

S4 Year Group

- Percentage of pupils achieving five or more awards at SCQF 5: 54% (VC 49%)
- Twenty-three pupils achieved seven National 5 awards and two pupils achieved all A grades passes.

S5 Year Group

- Percentage of pupils achieving five or more awards at SCQF 6: 27% (VC 24%)
- Percentage of pupils achieving three or more awards at SCQF 6: 48% (VC 46%)
- Percentage of pupils achieving one or more awards at SCQF 6: 73% (VC 67%)
- Eighteen pupils achieved five Highers.
- Four pupils achieved five A awards at Higher level.

School Uniform - Dressing for Excellence

Uniform is an important part of our school identity. It reinforces who we are as a community and allows students to feel a sense of pride in their school. It also helps prepare pupils for life after school where many will have to dress smartly for work.

Over the past four sessions, there have been **significant improvements** in our standard of uniform. An increasing number of pupils are now wearing blazers and I am delighted to report that over 95% of pupils are now wearing all black footwear. **A big thank you to you as parents/carers for supporting this.**

Our main driving force for striving towards 100% of pupils wearing black shoes is to ensure equity for all. No pupil or parent should feel pressured to wear/buy an expensive pair of "converse style" trainers. This was also highlighted by our young people through our pupil voice.

Our improved standards of uniform coincides with our increasing pattern of attainment.

The wearing of school uniform:

- Is invaluable in conveying a sense of community, wellbeing and purpose.
- Indicates a sense of pride in the school and helps pupils to form positive attitudes to the school and their school work.
- Protects children from the harmful effects of social distinction and competitive dressing.
- Promotes the school's identity in their community, with our immediate neighbours, local business and industry.
- Assists staff in the task of supervising pupils and keeping unwelcome visitors out of the school.

St. Benedict's High School's uniform policy is that all of our young people are required to wear the school uniform.

The school uniform consists of :

- A white school shirt/blouse, and school tie which is visible at all times. S4, S5 and S6 will wear the Senior tie.
- Tailored black trousers or black skirt - leggings, jeans, denims and tracksuits, are not acceptable under any circumstances.
- A school blazer with badge.
- Comfortable footwear (black in colour). **No Converse style trainers unless fully black in colour.**
- Plain black jumper or cardigan (optional). Black school jumpers should be of an unbranded style that allows the school tie to be clearly seen (v-neck). **Hoodies are not allowed.**





Attendance

Attendance Matters – Is your child missing out?

The importance of good attendance and timekeeping is essential for pupils to fulfil their potential. It is also a crucial life skill. If a pupil is not in school, they are missing learning.

It is important **we work together** to monitor this closely.


Parents/carers are by far the most important influence on children's lives and learning and are vital in shaping the mind set and behaviour of children.

You will receive attendance and timekeeping updates on all tracking reports you receive. Please pay attention to this.

What these figures mean -

Poor Attendance and Timekeeping – Missed Learning

100% Attendance	0 Days Missed	Gives your child the best chance of success and gets them off to a flying start.
95% Attendance	9 Days of Absence 1 week and 4 Days of Learning Missed	
90% Attendance	19 Days of Absence 3 Weeks and 4 Days of Learning Missed	Less chance of success. Makes it harder to progress.
85% Attendance	27 Days of Absence 5 Weeks and 3 Days of Learning Missed Almost half a term missed	Serious implications on learning and progress.
80% Attendance	36 Days of Absence 7 Weeks and 3 Days of Learning Missed Half a term missed	
75% Attendance	45 Days of Absence 9 Weeks and 1 Day of Learning Missed Almost 1 whole term missed	



What can you do to help?

- Be aware of the impact of regular absences – missing school is missing out.
- Take family holidays outside of term.
- Try to arrange non-urgent dental and medical appointments outside school hours.
- Establish a good routine in the mornings and evenings so your child is prepared for the school day ahead ; build up good habits of punctuality and attendance.
- Be involved with your child's education and school – ask questions.
- Inform the school if you child is absent due to illness or other reason.
- Discuss any problems or difficulties with the school, staff are there to help and will be supportive.

If your child has **90%** attendance they will have
the equivalent of:
½ a day off per week,
19 days off per year
247 days off over their school career of 13 academic
years, equivalent to over **1 year of lost education.**

We do understand that pupils can be unwell from time to time and that some pupils are affected more than others by health issues including anxiety. These pupils will be fully supported by school staff in their learning journey.

Coaching Mindset for Success

I have worked within St. Benedict's this last year, supporting pupils and staff with coaching. We are about to embark on an exciting programme for parents commencing in February.

As we navigate these uncertain times - where change and challenge are constant, we must safeguard our resilience and encourage this in our young people. When times are tough, the temptation is to take the easy option to reduce our stress - "drop the subject", "avoid a test", or "stay off" - but if we do this, we aren't helping our well-being - we are storing up trouble for later! So when pupils say to me that learning is difficult, I say, "brilliant! It's supposed to be!

But the strategies we can use to strengthen our mindset can make a huge difference in how we feel about learning and our success in every aspect of our lives.

Here are my top tips for mindset success:

1. Ask for help when your stuck
2. Make sure you get feedback from your class teachers and peers on what you can do better and what you need to focus on - so when you are doing homework or revision - ask for feedback.
3. Don't give up - where else can you get help? From BBC Bitesize, supported study and other resources your class teachers give you.
4. Get a study plan that means something to you - and is very specific! You should know what you are working on and when.
5. Don't just revise or study topics you like -do the things that "give you the fear" first - you will feel much better when you have done it!
6. When studying, find a quiet place; turn your phone into aeroplane mode; set a countdown timer and get answering a particular question or researching a specific topic. When the timer goes off, have a short break, then back to it!
7. Have clear goals about what you want and how you will do it.
8. Keep your fitness going - even a short walk can make a difference to our mood, which can help us have more energy.

So, helping ourselves Instead, thinking through how we can manage and respond to things we find stressful, have clear goals - rehearse our strategies for how we deal.

Parents Programme

In January, we will launch a video series for parents and pupils on Mindset; in February, our Mindset Coaching Programme for parents & carers will kick off. It will be fun, free and friendly and is a great personal development programme to help you and your children. Look out for more information after Christmas.




Dedicated to her sport, she has taken part in classes since the age of seven and to date has participated in over 61 different events!



M.V.P.

Some lucky S3 pupils have just returned from the residential CANI coaching trip at Dumfries House outdoor education centre in Cumnock where they looked at developing their leadership skills. They took part in a number of activities and challenges joined by members of staff including blindfold climbing and obstacle course. Developing the Young Workforce

DWF

Our S4 students have visited DWF law firm in Glasgow on two occasions to participate in the 5 Star Futures Programme. They are undertaking a programme enabling them to meet with lawyers and trainee lawyers who in turn help them to understand the difference between the qualities and skills they possess, and how to paint themselves in a positive light to an employer via several communications in order to be more work ready. The students have reaped the benefits of the staff's expertise and are now in the process of implementing the "STAR" approach – 'Situation, Task, Action, Result' to produce their own CV and cover letter in order to apply for any job and, more specifically, in the DWF office for work experience.



PWC

S3 ambassadors visited the Price Waterhouse Cooper company in Glasgow to participate in their 'New Skills Schools Series'. The friendly staff from PWC introduced who they were and what they do at PWC as an introduction to office life. Through a multitude of tasks, the students were able to use their skills for learning, life and work in order to develop their self-confidence and employability skills. At the end of the day, they were able to practice their communication techniques in order to deliver a presentation in groups to the employers adhering to a scenario.



S1 Digital Ambassadors

Our S1 students visited our associated primary schools in order to deliver a “what you need to digitally know” in order to survive in high school lesson. They explained how to use Satchel:One, Microsoft Teams and how to access homework. S1 ambassadors were keen to answer any questions or queries, and respond to any worries Primary 7s had about the imminent transition to high school.



S3 Students in the Community

Our S3 students worked with adults in the community at Johnstone Station Seven Hub. They assisted some adults in how to upskill their online knowledge of social media accounts, Spotify, set up online payments etc. This was incredibly well received by both the young people and adults as they all developed new skills.





Digital Learning

Over the past few years, we have continued to develop our digital learning approaches. Our main platforms continue to be Satchel One and Microsoft teams.

Satchel:One continues to be the platform we use to provide homework for pupils. This platform also allows yourself the opportunity of keeping up-to date with your child's homework and submission dates, using the unique Parent Code each child is supplied with.




Parents in Partnership

Raising Attainment

BGE Homework Club

Our BGE Homework Club (S1-S3) takes place every Thursday at lunchtime. Our Raising Attainment Project Leader, Miss Sweeney, and our Transition Teacher, Mrs Grey, work alongside staff volunteers and S6 students to provide help and support to S1-S3 pupils in their learning. Please encourage your children to come along for a quiet place to work and access to ICT. You can check your child's homework through the Satchel One app. Please contact the school if you have any difficulty using this and we will be happy to help.



Senior Phase Mentor Programme

As in previous years, our Senior Phase Mentor Programme continues to run offering additional help to all of our S4 and S5 students. This enhanced support builds on the work of Pastoral and Year Head and provides young people with the opportunity to discuss their achievements and concerns as they make progress throughout the year towards the prelims and the final exam diet in May. Staff offer support and advice regarding study skills, wellbeing and target setting at regular points in the school year. It is important at this time that students have a clear study timetable, are focused and coping with the demands that prelims will bring in order that our young people achieve their full potential across all subjects.



An extended mentoring programme is also being run by our Employability Key Worker, Lisa Wiggins. This programme focuses on a group of S5 students working closely during mentor time to prepare them for interviews as well as tips and guidance on how to dress and behave in an interview situation. These skills will be invaluable in building young people's confidence as they prepare to move out into the world of employment.

S5 Raising Attainment Seminar

Last week we delivered our annual S5 Raising Attainment Seminar which was a productive and enjoyable experience.

Our school chaplain, Father Michael delivered a motivational presentation which was very positively received. Students then attended a range of workshops on Study Skills, Mindsets and Meta-cognition as well as Team Building, Body Balance and Mindfulness. Volunteer staff prepared and implemented these allowing support and advice in a range of areas.

Our S6 students also contributed, providing an invaluable input to the day as they shared their experience of assessments with our current S5. Both positive and negative experiences were shared between students in order to ensure S5 can learn from the insight of their older peers.

Our final event of the day saw students attend an elective “Next Step” workshop where they chose from guidance in Careers, UCAS or Modern/Foundation Apprenticeships. Student feedback made clear that this was a particularly successful part of the day with pupils gaining a clearer understanding of where their learning can take them in future.

Our attainment seminars are designed to equip our students with the skills required to achieve their potential in the forthcoming exams, but it is equally important that we support our pupils to cope with the inevitable stress and pressure which they will experience. One of the key missions of our programme is to help our students to realise that they are resilient, have the capacity to cope and, with appropriate levels of study and support, are destined to achieve. We are looking forward to delivering a similar programme in February for our S4 students.





Literacy

IDL Software

We have been using IDL, a digital programme proven to improve reading and spelling ages, with the aim to improve reading and spelling skills. Learners have been enjoying using IDL and can see how it is improving their confidence in reading and writing across the curriculum. From tracking learner progress, it is clear there has already been a significant improvement in the reading and spelling ages of many pupils. As we move through the 22-23 session, we will continue to use IDL to support learners in literacy improvement. 

A group of S2 pupils visited the Kings Theatre in Glasgow to watch 'Beauty and The Beast'. A great afternoon had by all.





Martin Campbell (S6) has also been selected to play for the regional squad and has recently has been successful in his trial with Scotland School Boys.




The S1/2 Girls Football Team have been training on Wednesdays after school with coach Nicola and have attended two rounds of the Active Schools league.

First Year pupils have been settling in well in Religious Education in St. Benedict's.




First Year pupils worked together to develop their Bible referencing skills through their exploration of literary forms!

LEARNING & DEVELOPMENT



Senior pupils from the Technical Department were selected to take part in a workshop lead by the Royal Navy. The challenge was to build several structures outlined by the leaders. One example of the structure the pupils had to make was a free-standing tower of a certain height using the least number of parts, building a windmill that spins freely and is stable, building a wheelbarrow with a relay race on completion.

Over the course of a full session, you will receive the following communication.
