School Uniform - Dressing for Excellence

Uniform is an important part of our school identity. It reinforces who we are as a community and allows students to feel pride in their school. It also helps prepare pupils for life after school where many will have to dress smartly for work.

Over the past two sessions, there has been a significant improvement in our standards of uniform. An increasing number of pupils are now wearing blazers and I am delighted to report that 94% of pupils are now wearing all black footwear.

Our main driving force for striving towards 100% of pupils wearing black shoes is to ensure equity for all: that no pupil or parent feel pressured to wear/buy an expensive pair of "converse style" trainers. This was highlighted by our pupils through our pupil voice. I feel it is my duty to act in this area.

Our improved standards of uniform is also coinciding with our increasing pattern of attainment, which I would suggest is partly connected.

The wearing of school uniform:

- Is invaluable in conveying a sense of community, wellbeing and purpose.
- Indicates a sense of pride in the school and helps pupils to form positive attitudes to the school and their school work.
- · Protects children from the harmful effects of social distinction and competitive dressing.
- Promotes the school's identity in their community, with our immediate neighbours, local business and industry.
- Assists staff in the task of supervising pupils and keeping unwelcome visitors out of the school.

A reminder of our school uniform requirements. St. Benedict's High School's policy is that all of our pupils are required to wear the school uniform.

The School Uniform consists of:

- A white school shirt/blouse, and school tie which is visible at all times. S4, S5 and S6 will wear the Senior tie.
- Tailored black trousers or black skirt leggings, jeans, denim and tracksuits, are not acceptable under any circumstances.
- A school blazer with badge.
- Comfortable footwear (black in colour).
- Plain black jumper or cardigan (optional). Black school jumpers should be of an unbranded style that allows the school tie to be clearly seen (v-neck).





Improvement Priorities

Our improvement priorities for 2020-21 are:

- To promote the positive health and well-being of pupils, parents/carers and staff
- To develop high quality learning and teaching and assessment
- To further develop our Catholic ethos across the contexts for learning
- To continue to close the attainment gap between the most and least disadvantaged learners to ensure equity for all.

Curriculum – Developing skills for life, learning and work.

At St. Benedict's we are committed to developing the full potential of every young person by offering a curriculum in the Senior Phase which meets all learners' needs. We have introduced a number of new courses to broaden the curriculum and widen opportunities for our young people. This has increased opportunities for success at SQCF levels 5 and 6.

New Courses

- National 5 Health Sector
- National 5 Practical Electronics,
- Higher Communication
- Higher Dance
- Higher Health, Food and Technology

We have also introduced a Level 6 First Aid qualification for our senior pupils. This is proving extremely popular.

In addition, we continue to work closely with partners including West College Scotland to provide a range of academic and vocational options for our young people to prepare them for the world of work.

Positive Destinations

As you can see our young people continue to move into positive destinations. This is a credit to our young people, their families and the hard work of school staff. This includes our strong partnership with Skills Development (SDS) and further and higher education institutions.

Attendance and Timekeeping

We have been working hard this term to ensure that young people in St. Benedict's High School continue to achieve and attain to their highest level. Regular attendance and punctuality at school are essential for this. Your support here as a parent/carer is crucial.

Please ensure that your child is only absent from school if they are genuinely unwell or there is a valid reason. Absences must be reported to the school office by 8.45am. If young people are absent on a regular basis or if they are late to class, this is detrimental to their education and learning. Please be aware that if your child's attendance or timekeeping falls below the standards we expect, we have a duty of care to inform you and to follow Renfrewshire Council procedures.



Pupil Reports and Target Setting

Monitoring and tracking of your child's progress helps us to ensure your child can achieve their potential and is therefore a very important part of his/her education.

As part of our monitoring and tracking system, your child will be involved in regular discussions with staff to identify strengths, areas for development and next steps. Please also discuss these reports with your child.

In previous sessions the reporting of this would have been shared as follows:

- 1. A full written report detailing your child's strengths and areas for development within each subject of study.
- 2. Tracking reports detailing levels of achievement and ratings for effort, behaviour and homework.
- 3. A parent teacher meeting with an opportunity for a verbal report.

Due to COVID, our approaches to reporting have had to be adapted. As a result of not being able to accommodate parents into the school building the parents' meetings will be replaced by a second full written report initially.

We are currently developing an online system which would enable a virtual parents' meeting.

I am hoping this could be in place for the second half of the session.

If you have any issues you wish to discuss further, please contact your child's pastoral care teacher or year group Depute Head Teacher.



Exam Success 2020

The school community recently celebrated some of its best levels of attainment since the school opened. Hard work has certainly paid off!

S4 Year Group

Percentage of pupils achieving five or more awards at National 5: 47% (45% in 2019).

Thirty-three pupils achieved seven National 5 awards. Ten pupils achieved all A grades passes.

S5 Year Group (based on S4 roll)

Percentage of pupils achieving three or more awards at Higher level: 35% (33% in 2019).

Percentage of pupils achieving one or more awards at Higher level: 57% (56% in 2019).

Twenty pupils achieved five Highers.


Eight pupils achieved five A awards at Higher level.


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Chaplaincy

The Liturgical Life of the School



Caritas

The Caritas Award Programme looks a little different this year as we navigate uncertain times and the restrictions impacting our daily lives. Below is a reflection on the Caritas experience so far this year by some of our pupils.





This year, twenty-eight Sixth Year pupils are participating in the Caritas programme across our five parishes. Although the volunteering portion of Caritas has been difficult this year, every member of the Caritas Team has been striving to give back to the community.

We do this through stewarding and sanitising at the beginning and end of Mass, reading, greeting parishioners and ICT work. The response from the local parishioners has been so warm and friendly as they enjoy seeing the young members of the parish community being actively involved in the Church.



Each House is competing for a reward day at the cinema followed by a Pizza Buffet in school come Easter Time.


Pupils can win points for their House in the following ways:

- Health & Wellbeing points, walk or cycle to school
- Departmental Awards in each subject
- Monthly Tracking points through effort behaviour and homework
- Attendance points for 95% and above
- House Hero Points for exceptional contribution to the ethos of the school and the local community. Parents please email the school to nominate your child.

Each house group will also have a House Assembly in the New Year. Due to Covid restrictions this service will be done through the Social Education Programme. During this service classes will come together as a community and celebrate the positive impact all pupils have had on the school community. We will also aim to highlight particular pupils and the contribution they have made to their house through House Hero points. In addition to this, Senior House Captains will deliver motivational talks and Fr. Michael will have a religious and supportive input to all Houses.

Lastly, and possibly most importantly, please be aware that the House Points are updated each month and displayed in the Street Area of the school. Malawi Partnership

As I'm sure you are aware, our school's partnership with St. Patrick's Seminary is an unbreakable one. It provides endless opportunities and is the foundation of an abundance of friendships. I have been fortunate enough that a large portion of my school experience has involved this partnership, and this is something I will forever be grateful for.

In February 2018, seven boys from St. Patrick's Seminary travelled to Scotland along with Fr. Sam and Fr. Andrew. They stayed with host families within our school and countless bonds were built. A strong sense of attachment developed in such a short period of time which made saying goodbye extremely hard, however we all knew we had formed friendships for life.

Following this trip from the pupils of St. Patrick's in February, myself and several other host pupils were given the life-changing opportunity to travel to Malawi in June 2019. We visited the local primary schools, maternity wards and orphanages. A large portion of our time was spent in St. Magdalena's, a boarding school for disabled children, each child was so full of life and made us feel extremely welcome and participated in many activities with us. Over the course of the two weeks, we got to know each boy from St. Patrick's Seminary and developed endless friendships; each boy was so eager to share their own stories and find out everything about us.

As the trip progressed, we were hit by the immense cultural difference and the harsh reality of life in a rural area of a developing country and came to the realisation of how lucky we truly are. Laughs were shared, tears were shed, and memories were made, which I know we will cherish forever.

Our partnership with St. Patrick's remains a strong one despite the disappointment of the 2020 trip being cancelled due to COVID-19. However, we remain optimistic and hope that we are able to visit our friends again in 2021.

We continue to support St. Patrick's Seminary through many areas of fundraising. At the end of November, we managed to send a Christmas parcel to each pupil in St. Patrick's Seminary, as we do every year. 

Numeracy


This year our pupils experienced a very successful Maths Week Scotland. They applied their Numeracy skills in a range of subjects including Computing, Technical, Science and more!







In the Maths department, many pupils are developing their key skills with the Numeracy Ninjas program that we run. This program is designed to fill gaps in students' basic mental calculation strategies and to empower them with the numeracy skills and fluency required to fully the Mathematics curriculum as they progress up the school. We have seen a huge improvement in performance with some pupils raising their average score by 7 marks over the 10 week program.

The pupils felt the positive benefits of the fresh air and it helped increase motivation levels.





House Groups

Pupils in each house group are encouraged to earn points for their house for being a Health and Wellbeing Hero. Kindness is at the heart of our school and we actively encourage our pupils to be kind to each other.



Social Education Lessons For All Pupils

All pupils in St. Benedict's completed a six-week unit of work during Social Education. The resource had six weekly themes, with 'Week 1' starting at the return to school following the summer break.

The themes for the weeks were carefully considered to communicate what it is that we want children to hear and feel from their school environment in the weeks following their transition back from lockdown. These themes were developed based on psychological theory and logical sequences of learning. Each theme was linked to the CFE Health and Wellbeing Experiences and Outcomes and the lessons were very well received by our pupils.

Mental Health

Well done to some of our Sixth year Pupils who have just completed an eightweek programme to support our younger pupils with their mental health. Eighteen Senior pupils signed up to this programme with Mr Harvey and developed their skills in the following areas:

Peer Mentoring, Building Relationships with Mentees, Understanding
Psychological Perspectives with Mentees; Understanding Psychological
Perspectives of Behaviour, Anti-Bullying, Supporting Vulnerable Pupils; Problem
Solving; Communication Skills; Teamwork & Confidentiality.

STEM

Nuffield Future Researchers

Young STEM Leaders

A large number of S6 pupils have volunteered to be Young STEM Leaders in St. Benedict's. These pupils will learn how to develop learning experiences to teach STEM to others. Pupils will produce resources to be used by pupils and staff alike.

STEM Week

This will take place from the $8^{th} - 14^{th}$ of March. Staff are developing a programme for S1 pupils to experience a range of STEM activities throughout the school.

#IAMSET Student Careers Development Programme

This enrichment programme will launch in the school during STEM Week. The aim of the programme is to develop STEM skills in pupils throughout their time in St. Benedict's by offering a range of activities and supporting pupils in applying for Arkwright Scholarships in the future. The first group involved will be from our current S2 cohort.




Extra-Curricular Clubs

In September, we launched our extra-curricular clubs for S1 and S2 pupils. These ranged from sports clubs, movie and debate clubs to homework support, languages and art club.

Many pupils have been enjoying these lunchtime activities and have become very involved in the wider life of the school.

For the first time, we have tied attendance at our extra-curricular clubs to the house system. Each pupil was issued with a score card, and each time they attended a club they received a stamp. Once their card was filled, they were entered into a prize draw for house points (3)

School Library Services

Our school library has now re-opened and is available to students in all year-groups. Pupils in S1, S2 and S3 can order books via the forms in their English classrooms, while learners in S4, S5 and S6 can obtain books via the Click and Collect service. Modern Languages House Points

Modern Languages staff have been busy closely monitoring the effort and application of pupils within classes in order that our month's allocation of 500 House Points can be fairly and evenly distributed to those pupils who have best exemplified our school values of trust, tolerance, integrity, love and respect. Those whose efforts in the subject have shown these qualities will be awarded with 25 points for their house – points that will, no doubt, make a significant difference to their house's chances of gaining the lead at whole-school level.





Language Ambassadors

Our Advanced Higher linguists have recently been busy recording materials to be shared with all of our cluster primary schools so that the younger children can learn a love of languages from those who, not so long ago, were in exactly the same schools as they were. We look forward to sharing these as we progress into 2021.

Primary And Secondary Languages Funding

We at St. Benedict's have recently been awarded additional funding to further enhance the cluster's approach to languages in primary and secondary. This funding will be used to upgrade and bring languages to the primary school estate, as well as for purchasing further resources to benefit all of our schools.



All that remains to be said is a huge thank-you to all of our pupils, parents and partners for your support and encouragement of all that we do within the faculty. Please have a peaceful and well-rested Christmas break.



Employability

I was thrilled to see so many of our pupils commit to learning outside of the classroom during these unprecedented times. We have managed to form and keep external partnerships, most recently with Clearview Minds, and Law firm DWF.

Clearview minds has worked with 12 of our S4 pupils to engage in work-place skills and is a four-part series spread over four-day seminars. DWF law firm have kindly given 20 of our S4 pupils the opportunity to explore the workplace, develop personal goals and give them a taste of organisation, networking and what a career in Law make look like.

By building on the excellent learning and teaching which takes place in St. Benedict's High School we have been able to make significant improvements in attainment. This has led to St. Benedict's recording our highest level of S4 and S6 attainment since the school opened.





BGE Homework Club

Our BGE Homework Club (S1-S3) takes place every Wednesday at lunchtime. Our P7/S1 Transition teacher, Mrs Gilmour, works alongside other staff volunteers to provide help and support to S1-S3 pupils in their learning. Numbers attending are steadily increasing and I would ask that you encourage your children to come along for a quiet place to work and access to ICT. You can check your child's homework through the Show My Homework app. Please contact the school if you have any difficulty using this and we will be happy to help.

Senior Phase Mentor Programme

Our Senior Phase Mentor Programme has been up and running even earlier this session to enable us to support students during these difficult times. Mentors are volunteer staff members who serve as an additional point of contact for Senior Phase students. This enhanced support builds on the work of Pastoral and Year Head and provides young people with the opportunity to discuss their achievements and concerns as they make progress throughout the year and for Higher students working towards the exam diet in May. Staff offer support and advice regarding study skills, wellbeing and target setting at regular points in the school year. We have already had meetings in October and November and mentor groups will meet again before the Christmas holidays to ensure that students have a clear study timetable, are focused and coping with the demands that prelim and the assessment diet will bring. All meetings are designed to support young people to achieve their full potential across all of their subjects.





This session we have extended the mentoring programme to include input from our Employability Project Leader, Mr Cook. This programme sees a group of S4 students working closely during mentor time to prepare personal statements for college and job applications. Students have also been learning how to prepare for interviews with opportunities to put these skills into action through mock interviews.

Wider Achievement Opportunities

In keeping with the ethos of our Catholic school we see attainment in its widest context and try to ensure all our young people have the chance to gain skills for life, learning and work. As in previous years we have made a commitment to ensuring all S6 students were provided with First Aid training to ensure they gain skills which are of value and relevant to the world of work. By working in partnership with recognised workplace trainers all S6 were provided with the opportunity to gain a qualification in "Emergency First Aid at Work". This qualification not only enhances the CVs of our young people and makes them more attractive to prospective employers but it also provides them with opportunities to show their abilities to learn in a new and very different context from the traditional curriculum. This term we have also rolled out this opportunity to students in the S5 Health Sector class as this perfectly complimented their studies as allowing them to gain a level six award.

This is the ultimate aim of all raising attainment strategies employed here at Saint Benedict's High School – we are constantly seeking new and exciting ways for young people to develop their gifts and talents. Yes, we want our young people to achieve their academic potential but we see this as just one aspect of our mission to allow them to become the best version of themselves. By offering new courses such as the first aid course above we are providing our young people with a rich learning experience which will provide them with the best opportunity to succeed in the years ahead.







Inclusion Support Assistant -ISA

It has been a delight working with the pupils of St. Benedict's in my role as Inclusion Support Assistant or ISA as the staff call me!

My goal is to help raise the attainment in school, engage with parents/carers and work with S1-S3 to encourage positive decision making, improve attendance and provide alternatives to exclusions. I may have spoken to some if you on the phone to check on your child's absence and I feel this is a great way of getting to have a chat and hopefully find out a bit more about any worries or concerns your child has about coming to school. So, if you see the school number pop up on your phone, don't panic, it will most likely be me phoning to check all is ok!

I work very closely with the Pastoral Care Team and Home Link Service in school and they will often ask me to support pupils who are having difficulties with a variety of different issues. My work is very much focussed around resilience, respect, emotional literacy and managing emotions in a healthy way. Working on nurturing our pupils in a calm, caring and consistent manner has made a big difference to our young people and they really appreciate having someone to come and talk to when they are going through hard times.

It has been a pleasure getting to know the pupils in St. Benedict's and supporting them to achieve their potential.








Science

Numeracy is a key skill used when in Technical. We were promoting Maths Week Scotland in the Technical Department when using our CAD software 'Autodesk Inventor'.


